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Reading

We have recently had a reading challenge at Marshland with 52 children completing this. 52 is the highest number we have ever had But it does mean that over 30 children did not read at home that week. Your child will be bringing a reading book and a reading record home from Foundation Stage Two through to Year Six over the half-term. This might be a 'colour band' book, a chosen book from the library or they might be a free reader. In addition to this, some children might have eBooks linked to our phonics scheme Little Wandle. Please do all you can to get them reading during the break.



Reading is a life skill; something your children will do every day of their lives and we want them to be the very best they can be. We will do all we can at Marshland and we are planning even more different rewards and initiatives, but when they come home with a book at the end of the day, we need your support. Please sit and read to your child, let them read to you, share a book ... or if your child is more independent, just sign to say you know they have read to themselves. Working together, we can improve reading. We have made some really good steps forwards—let's keep this going.
