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### **Support for Parents and Carers**

**UNIFORM** If you are unsure whether you are eligible for free school meals, it is worth checking on DMBC's website. Not only does this entitle your child to a school meal, it opens up opportunities for free holiday clubs and meals. Even if you are out of work for a couple of days, you can apply and this entitlement stays with the children for a number of years. If you need support to access the online application, please contact the school office. <u>Apply for free school meals - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> **UNIFORM** We have a uniform shop on a Thursday afternoon. This allows you to come in and make a donation for school uniform. We also welcome any donations, so please pass us any school clothing that your child/ children will no longer wear. And finally, don't forget our FareShare shop on a Thursday afternoon—with free tea and coffee.

#### **Attendance**

We have started to see a decline in our attendance which really isn't great and we need to start to build it back up again following the chicken pox outbreak at the end of December. We have introduced an additional stage to our process and this is a meeting in school to talk about the impact absence has on your child's learning. If this does not lead to improvements, we are working with our Educational Welfare Officer, and although issuing fines is not want we want to do, we will do this if your child's attendance does not improve. **We must see improvements**.

We must have your support with this—we can't do it without you! This does mean the children arrive on time and are collected at 3:15. There is an increasing number of children being collected in an afternoon before the end of the day. This means that your child misses some or all of the last lesson in an afternoon and if this is regular, they will always miss that lesson. Children should only be collected early **if they have an appointment that cannot be made out of school hours.**


Your opinion matters at Marshland. Thank you for all the responses we received during our 'Celebration of Learning'. We are worling hard at putting things right.
